2024 is truly an amazing year for Vegecoopia CIC. Our organisation has grown a lot, just like our vegetables! In early January, we secured our own allotment plot to cultivate. Despite its small size, we were able to lay the foundation for upcoming gardening, cultural food, and craft events. Supported by Big Issue Invest's accelerator programme, our team gradually grew from a duo to a board of three directors, with 2 full-time equivalent staff members, aiming to develop a Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) scheme in Kingston upon Thames.

As food growers, what's more satisfying than connecting local, ethical, and sustainable food production to consumption? We are fortunate to collaborate with members of Kingston Hive, who not only give us additional food-growing space but also, unexpectedly, the opportunity to run a community shop, "The Honey Pot." This is literally a plot twist for us — Vegecoopia needs to start engaging in retail in addition to offering gardening services and experiential activities. There is so much to learn, along with plenty of trial and error. Challenging, yet exciting!

With extra support from Kingston Charitable Foundation and Kingston Council, we managed to launch The Honey Pot in midsummer. Alongside the weekend shop, our extraordinary team also delivered a series of cultural cooking sessions and community craft events in Kingston, including our first sixmonth-long community art project, supported by the Greater London Authority.

None of this would have been possible without the funding we received, the efforts of our team, and, most importantly, the support from our beneficiaries and customers, including not only Hong Kong migrants but also local Kingston residents. This year, I have truly felt the power of cooperation and collaboration. A sincere thank you to all of Vegecoopia's stakeholders — and I hope the organisation continues to thrive in the coming year, aligning with our missions and vision.

OUR VISION & MISSIONS


As an agri-food educational organisation based in Kingston upon Thames, we aim to build community bonds and resilience through sustainable food practices.



This is a continuation of last year's Culturally Lovely Lunch series. Participants from diverse ethnic backgrounds learnt about new culinary practices and cultural recipes, as well as how to eat nutritiously — an essential component of the NHS Eatwell Guide. We also shared how to grow the vegetables we used, or how to access surplus food throughout the borough, so as to increase people's access to affordable food.




